



## RA SCHOOLS SHOW 2021 TO EXHIBIT WORK BY EMERGING ARTISTS

17 June – 4 July 2021

RA Schools Studios, Weston Studio and The Ronald and Rita McAulay Gallery

The *RA Schools Show 2021* will present the work of sixteen contemporary artists graduating from the Royal Academy Schools. Fourteen of the artists are from the class of 2020, as all of the students at the RA Schools were offered the opportunity to do a catch-up year of study due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. For the first time, the exhibition will run alongside a digital platform, a parallel experimental project space that will provide context to the artists' work and broader practices.

The onsite exhibition will be shown across the students' working studios, the Weston Studio and The Ronald and Rita McAulay Gallery. Pieces have been produced with a wide range of media, including video and sound work, performance, sculpture and painting, encapsulating the artists' years of study at the RA Schools. This year, works will include a multiscreen installation exploring the use of electromagnetic fields in scientific research, a film screening housed in the fuselage of an aeroplane and interventions within the Royal Academy building itself.

The online platform will provide information to visitors and enhance the experience of the onsite show, whilst retaining its own distinct identity. It will engage with the possibilities and limitations of art on screen and display new, virtual works. The platform will make use of sound, moving image, 3-D sculptural animation, text, performance and drawing.

**Brian Griffiths, Senior Lecturer at the RA Schools and artist, said:** "This isn't the compulsory, and rather dull – 'what we did on lockdown or my pandemic year gestures' exhibition. This is an expansive, vivid and witty show that reminds me of life's many shapes and glorious intensities."

**Cathie Pilkington RA, Keeper of the Royal Academy of Arts, said:** "I am incredibly proud to be able to present our real, physical RA Schools graduation show 2021. This is the RA Schools' first graduation show since I became Keeper in May 2020. It has been a year of exceptional circumstances, with the artists in this show moving between their studios at the RA, to remote learning and back again. It is a testament to the core values of the Royal Academy as the home of the UK's oldest independent Art School that we have been able to support our students through an additional academic year. I would like to extend my thanks to all the dedicated RA Schools team for

their enormous contributions towards realising this show and celebrate with our amazing students – originally the year of 2020 – who will finally have the opportunity to share their work.”

Many of the works on display will be available for sale and directly support the development of the students and the production of new work.

### **About the Royal Academy Schools**

The Royal Academy Schools is an independent school of contemporary art that offers up to 17 artists each year the opportunity to participate in a free, three-year, postgraduate programme. Founded in 1769, the RA Schools remains independent to this day. This independence enables the postgraduate programme to constantly adapt to the individual needs of each student. Discussion and debate is fuelled by a variety of lectures, artist talks, group critiques and tutorials given by leading contemporary artists, Royal Academicians, critics, writers and theorists. In February 2019, the Royal Academy announced a vital renewal project for the RA Schools, to ensure its future as a world-renowned institution, with a major gift of £10m from Julia and Hans Rausing. In recognition of this gift, the RA Schools buildings will be called *The Julia and Hans Rausing Campus*. Designed by Sir David Chipperfield CBE RA, who recently completed the Royal Academy's transformative redevelopment, together with Julian Harrap, the project will preserve the heritage of the RA Schools and ensure it remains at the forefront of art education. This restoration and renewal project will guarantee the RA Schools continues to provide an exceptional contemporary postgraduate art education.

### **About the Royal Academy of Arts**

The Royal Academy of Arts was founded by King George III in 1768. It has a unique position in being an independent, privately funded institution led by eminent artists and architects whose purpose is to be a clear, strong voice for art and artists.
