The Royal Academy of Arts' Summer Exhibition is a unique celebration of contemporary art and architecture, providing a vital platform and support for the artistic community. Each year, the Royal Academy of Arts presents a number of prizes for outstanding works within the exhibition. The prestigious £25,000 Charles Wollaston Award, one of the most significant art prizes in the country, is also presented to the 'most distinguished work' in the exhibition. This year the following have been awarded:

The Royal Academy of Arts Charles Wollaston Award

£25,000 awarded by a panel of judges appointed by the Royal Academy's President and Council for the most distinguished work in the exhibition.

The Thomas Burberry Prize for Print

£20,000 for a print in any medium.

Prize awarded to: Christine Wilkinson, WASHING MACHINE 2 (Cat no.947)

The AXA Art Prize UK 2023

£10,000 for an outstanding work of figurative art by a student.

Prize awarded to: Olga Mun, IMPOSSIBLE PAINTING (Cat no.62)

The Jack Goldhill Award for Sculpture

£10,000 for a sculpture.

The British Institution Fund Award

The British Institution Fund was established to promote excellence in the arts through the awarding of prizes to students. Work is assessed across a comprehensive range of creative disciplines from painting to architecture. £5,000 will be awarded this year by the trustees.

The Maire Ragnhild Hollingsworth Prize for Oil Painting

£5,000 to be awarded to an artist who is considered by the judging panel to have placed particular emphasis on the exploration of oil painting, using oil as the predominant medium. No restriction shall be made as to the base material, which may be canvas, panel or any other surface.

The Hugh Casson Drawing Prize

For an original work on paper in any medium, where the emphasis is clearly on drawing.

£4,000 for a painting or sculpture.

The Arts Club Award

£2,500 awarded to an artist aged 35 or under for a work in any medium.

Notes to Editors

About the Charles Wollaston Award

The annual Royal Academy of Arts Charles Wollaston Award was set up in 1978 with a donation from Charles Wollaston (1914-1992) who was an enthusiastic supporter of the RA and a lecturer in art. Following his death, the RA received a substantial bequest, which has enabled it to endow a £25,000 prize in perpetuity.

History of the Summer Exhibition

One of the founding principles of the Royal Academy of Arts was to "mount an annual exhibition open to all artists of distinguished merit" to finance the training of young artists in the Royal Academy Schools. The Summer Exhibition has been held every year without interruption since 1769 and continues to play a significant part in raising funds to finance the students of the RA Schools. The RA Schools is the longest established art school in the UK and offers the only free three-year postgraduate programme in Europe.

As the world's largest open submission contemporary art show, the Summer Exhibition provides a unique platform for emerging and established artists to showcase their works to an international audience, comprising a range of media from painting and printmaking to photography, sculpture, architecture and film. Royal Academicians are automatically entitled to submit up to six works to the Summer Exhibition and the rest of the exhibition features work by those invited by the committee and external entrants.
